President's Letter

Dear Olmsted Society Members:

I am excited to begin my third term as President of the Olmsted Society. The dedicated core of volunteers who have led the organization over many years are inspirational in their commitment to community and long term preservation of the Olmsted legacy in Riverside.

Plans are afoot to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Olmsted Society founded in 1968, and to commemorate the founder, Robert Heidrich. For this special event, 50 trees will be planted during 2017 and 2018. We planted 10 trees at our April 29th workday and another 10 trees will be planted at our September 30th workday.

Members are encouraged to engage in the landscape workdays planned this season. One can see considerable progress on Riverside Drive on the banks of the Des Plaines River to eradicate invasive plants and improve the view. Come out with your kids, neighbors and others who may wish to improve the landscape of Riverside. The Village Forester, and Olmsted volunteers coordinate these events and the schedule can be found at olmstedsocity.org or visit our Facebook page.

We have made a consistent effort in the past years to present meaningful programs in partnership with the Riverside Library and then record the presentations for use on Riverside TV and YouTube. In the coming months, we plan to partner with the Morton Arboretum to present topics such as proper tree care, tree planting, tree identification, and invasive species control. Keep an eye on Channel 6 or come out to the Riverside Library to hear these sessions live.

Finally, as we look to the future, the Olmsted Society will continue to raise funds via walking tours, events, and membership dues. However, if you have the resources to endow landscape workdays, or other specific efforts, please let us know. The resilience of committed members created an organization that has lasted 50 years, and we look forward to the next 50!

Free tours on June 8 celebrate Frank Lloyd Wright's 150th Historic Wright sites host neighborhood open houses in Chicago and Oak Park

Join the party as the Frank Lloyd Wright Trust celebrates the 150th anniversary of the birth of the iconic architect with free tours and refreshments at the Trust's popular tour sites in Oak Park and Chicago.

Festive Neighborhood Open Houses will take place in the evening on Thursday, June 8, Frank Lloyd Wright's birthday, at the following locations:

- Frank Lloyd Wright Home and Studio (1889/1898), 6-8 p.m., 951 Chicago Ave., Oak Park, Ill. Wright's first home and studio is where the innovative architect experimented with design concepts and developed the Prairie style of architecture.
- Frederick C. Robie House (1908-10), 6-8 p.m., 5757 S. Woodlawn Ave., Chicago. This masterpiece of the Prairie style and icon of modern architecture with magnificent leaded glass windows is located on the University of Chicago campus.
- **Emil Bach House** (1915), 4-7 p.m., 7415 N. Sheridan Road, Chicago. Built after Wright returned to the United States after an extended stay in Europe, this fully restored house is intimate in scale and points toward Wright's future stylistic direction.

Free tours at each building will be offered first-come, first-served. Refreshments will be served outdoors after guests complete their tours.

Frank Lloyd Wright was born in Spring Green, Wis. and made his name in the Chicago area, which boasts more Wright buildings that anywhere else.

His story is rich with the influences that sparked his imagination and shaped his completely original talent. He was a pioneer of many concepts that continue to apply to modern living in the 21st century, such as integrating architecture and interior design, combining architecture with the natural environment and incorporating an open interior floor plan in home design.

Wright began his career in 1887 in Chicago as an apprentice and later became a key assistant in Louis Sullivan's studio. After five years with Adler and Sullivan, Wright opened his own business and quickly built a successful practice, in demand for his distinctive, ground-hugging homes inspired by the flat Midwestern landscape. This vision for a new American architecture eventually became known as the Prairie style.

At our FLOS workday on April 8, 2017, a special training event led by Village Forester, Michael Collins and Morton Arboretum staff was held at Longcommon and Downing triangle. This training prepared volunteers to lead small groups in planting trees during our upcoming April 29th workday at Indian Gardens.. FLOS will be planting trees in partnership with the Village of Riverside and RBHS students to kick off our 50 year Golden Jubilee anniversary. Two truckloads of mulch were used in the

large planting bed with the arborvitae along Longcommon Road.

Twenty four volunteers participated in mulching and planting 11 trees and shrubs that were donated by Morton Arboretum. We planted Bald Cypress trees, Bottlebrush Buckeye, Ninebark and Spicebush shrubs. Thank you Morton Arboretum for donating the plantings and for sharing your expertise in planting.



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Happy 50th Anniversary Frederick Law Olmsted Society of Riverside. To celebrate our Golden Jubilee, we plan to plant 50 trees during several workday in 2017 & 2018. The first 15 trees were planted at our workday on April 29, 2017 in Indian Gardens and another 10 trees will be planted at our September 30th workday.

Nine shrubs were also planted.

Tree planting was made possible with the awesome help of 28 Riverside-Brookfield Hight School students and 6 RB teachers and parents. A representative from Morton Arboretum was in attendance to promote and support volunteerism in the community. Twelve more volunteers from the Olmsted Society pitched in to help plant and remove invasive garlic mustard.

Students and our volunteers started the morning pulling garlic mustard for our annual Great Garlic Mustard Pull. We filled 10 large garbage bags with garlic mustard.

March 8: The Impacts of Exotic Species on Native Trees

In the first in a series of lectures called "From One Arboretum to Another." Lydia Scott of the Morton Arboretum spoke about the impacts of non-native plant species on Riverside's tree population. Ms. Scott is the Director of the Chicago Region Trees Initiative and Manager of the Morton Arboretum's Community Trees Program.




