President's Letter

Dear Members.

Of trees and telephones...

Almost everyone who knows me is aware that I don't have an iPhone and don't even carry my flip phone unless forced to. I am a Luddite and have never adapted to having an electronic device become a permanent extension of my arm. Occasionally, however, there is value to these devices, and as we move into the colors of fall (here's hoping!) people may be more conscious of the trees around them, as green turns to various shades of gold, red, brown, and even purple. To that end, I want to remind people that they can use their smart phones (since these are so ubiquitous) to have some fun and learn about the trees in our landscape – especially now that the new path along the river is finished and it invites us to view the charms of the Des Plaines River.

As many folks know, Riverside was designated an arboretum in 2015, as a planned collection of trees, in the same way as Morton Arboretum (if not on as grand a scale). Guthrie Park has their trees labeled as to type, but if you are elsewhere in town, you may not know what each specimen is; enter the "Tree Finder"!

The <u>Tree Finder</u> can be found within the <u>Landscape Advisory Commission (LAC) pages</u> of the Riverside website. The LAC pages cover many aspects of Riversides' landscape design, as well as broader issues of plantings, conservation, and LAC-sponsored activities. You can also find instructions to use both the Tree Finder and the iNaturalist app, the latter of these two allows you to take a photo of nearly every plant, flower, bug or beast and upload it to learn more about what you've seen.

But, back to finding out about trees... the Tree Finder is a map of trees on Riverside's public lands, so you can learn more about all those unlabeled trees outside of Guthrie Park. The detail of this map is amazing – you can get lots of information about the trees you may have strolled, bicycled, or driven past for years.

Lots of thanks are due to the LAC members who have brought these resources together, so try them and see Riverside in a new light (but gaslight is still fine for streetlamps).

The Tree Finder web address is longer than most people care to type (or remember), so use the link provided on this page or point your tablet or smart phone camera to the square at right to use the Tree Finder.

Walking Tours of Historic Riverside

Last Regular Tour of the Year: Sunday, October 24

The last regularly scheduled Sunday afternoon tour will be of Riverside's South Division on October 24. The tour includes Swan Pond Park, Indian Gardens, Scottswood Common, Wright's Coonley Estate and homes by Jenney, Drummond, Vinci, Whittlesey, and a home designed by Olmsted's partner, Calvert Vaux.

The tour lasts two-hours and departs at 2:00 PM from the Riverside Train Depot (90 Bloomingbank Rd. – main train station, east side of platform).

Tickets are \$20 per person (\$15 for seniors 62+ and Olmsted Society members) and payments made via PayPal only.

Reservation requests must be made by email to tours@olmstedsociety.org and must include a return phone number. All reservations will be confirmed and scheduled based on our limited group capacity and the availability of docents.

WGN Comes to Riverside for a Tour

On Tuesday, September 7, 2021, WGN TV's Morning News segment "Around Town with Ana Belaval" came to Riverside to experience and highlight the Olmsted Society's walking tours of our fair village of Riverside.

Ana and her crew were met at the Riverside Railroad Station at 7:00 AM by Olmsted Society stalwarts Yvonne Lucero, Aberdeen Marsh-Ozga, and Sandie and Jim Petrzilka.

Subsequently, over the next three hours, through several short interludes and two longer interviews, TV viewers learned the reasons for Riverside's importance as a National Landmark and were taken on a tour of some of Riverside's most iconic homes and sites.

Riverside sites visited included the railroad station and water tower (that segment was interrupted hilariously by three consecutive Metra trains with Ana Belaval gesticulating wildly as they passed), a gas lamp in the Scottswood Common, the Presbyterian Church, the William LeBaron Jenny-designed Schermerhorn and Reverend Trowbridge houses; the curving tree lined roads; and the Frank Lloyd Wright-designed Coonley Estate.

It was a memorable experience for all involved and has led to a large spike in inquiries and signups for our walking tours.

Modern in the Middle: Chicago Houses, 1929-1975

Join Riverside residents and authors Michelangelo Sabatino and Serge Ambrose for a presentation of their new book Modern in the Middle: Chicago Houses, 1929-1975 (co-authored with Susan Benjamin) followed by a conversation with Kim Freeark and architect John Vinci about Riverside's Freeark House – one of the homes profiled in the book.

Serge Ambrose is an architect and engineer focused on contemporary design and the conservation of 20th Century architectural heritage. He has worked on building projects in Florida, Texas and Illinois and has presented conservation research at several Docomomo US Symposia and other conferences. Serge is a member of the Association for Preservation Technology and has served on the Riverside (IL) Historical Commission. Serge served as the Docomomo US/Chicago Board Chair from 2016-2020. He is currently working on the restoration of the 1930's modernist Benda House and landscape in Riverside, IL.



Michelangelo Sabatino trained as an architect, preservationist, and historian. Professor Sabatino currently directs the PhD program in architecture and is the inaugural John Vinci Distinguished Research Fellow. Throughout his career Sabatino has focused new light on larger patterns of design discourse and production during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries: his book Pride in Modesty: Modernist Architecture and the Vernacular Tradition in Italy (2011) was translated into Italian and won critical acclaim and multiple awards, including the Society of Architectural Historians' Alice Davis Hitchcock Award. His recent books include Canada: Modern Architectures in

History (with Rhodri Windsor Liscombe, 2016), Avant-Garde in the Cornfields: Architecture, Landscape, and Preservation in New Harmony (with Ben Nicholson, 2019), and Making Houston Modern: The Life and Architecture of Howard Barnstone (with Barrie Scardino Bradley and Stephen Fox, 2020).



John Vinci is an award-winning architect, author, and preservationist. He grew up a child of Italian immigrants on Chicago's South Side and attended the Illinois Institute of Technology, which was then under the direction of the legendary Modernist architect Ludwig Mies van der Rohe. Vinci's pioneering restoration projects include Frank Lloyd Wright's Robie House and Home Studio, Sullivan's Chicago Stock Exchange Trading Room and the Carson Pirie Scott Building, and Root's Monadnock Building. His design work, meanwhile, includes notable buildings such as the Arts Club of Chicago, numerous award-winning residences including the Freeark House in Riverside,

and more than fifty major exhibitions at the Art Institute of Chicago and other museums.



Kim Freeark is a retired IT consultant who has lived in Riverside since 2016. That year, she purchased her parents' "international style" home, which was designed by architects John Vinci and Lawrence Kenny and built in 1975. Kim enjoys gardening, reading, and traveling.

Patriots' Park, July 10

Our eight volunteers were at Patriots' Park on July 10 to trim the shrubs covering the pathway, weed the flower bed, remove dead shrubs, and invasive plants. The path was covered with shrubs but with Michael Collins's guidance and knowledge, we were able to clear it.

Indian Gardens Restoration Update, September 18

In May our volunteers cleared invasive plants from the riverbank by Indian Gardens. On September 18, eleven volunteers collected native plant seeds to scatter in that area. Then, we planted gray sedge, false hop, and fox sedges. These sedges thrive in wetlands and along riverbanks. Michael Collins, Village Forester, dug the holes for the sedges with an auger. Thanks to Shawn Sinn for his expertise in picking plants that will survive in this area.

Help Beautify Our Public Parks

For 2021, we continue to team up with the Village of Riverside to help beautify our green spaces. Due to the pandemic, you must register 24 hours in advance to participate in a workday. The number of participants may be limited and anyone who did not register in advance may not participate.

Frederick Law Olmsted designed the parks in Riverside to provide changing vistas for both pedestrians & vehicles. His plan can be better realized by reducing shrub overgrowth, eliminating weeds, and opening the river view. Join us as we tame, and then maintain your public parks of Riverside.

All workdays are scheduled for **Saturdays from 9 AM to 12 PM**. Bring your own **work gloves and a water bottle**. All landscaping supplies and pandemic-safe snacks will be provided. All participants must wear masks and maintain social distance. You will be informed of specific health and safety requirements when you make advanced reservations to participate.
