## President's Letter

Dear Members.

Here we are in what the calendar says should be full summer; this means fireflies, chipmunks, weeds, and storms. For many of us, besides covering pots and gardens with hardware cloth or chicken wire to reduce marauders, some are still finding broken branches from Riversides' brief, unhappy encounter with wind and rain in June.

Mother Nature is not always kind, and she has now provided more sun to our streets and parks, but our landscape has paid a heavy price. Many of the freshly cut tree trunks give us a "new view" into how old these organisms were...certainly some of the losses included plantings from Riverside's early days. Beyond the shade we normally enjoy, the loss of habitat for our wildlife is huge. Birds, bugs, small animals, fungus, and other life-forms are impacted. A neighbor with a bat house on their garage now finds the red-bellied woodpecker is almost done reducing it to Swiss cheese, looking for insects since the storm. Even squirrels, destructive though they can be, are at some disadvantage for summer homes and winter nests-they may start to look to manmade structures for shelter (e.g., chimneys). It is probable the village has a working estimate of how many trees on our public lands are gone, but the total loss of canopy and associated plant matter would be hard to assess.

Tree removal and replacement goes on in the village continuously, but the task before us is going to take more than a generation to make significant progress. Residents of Riverside can help, not only by replacing trees in their own yards (look on the LAC website for advice on what to plant, and call JULIE for those utility grids!) but also by helping the FLOS Landscape Committee on its workdays. Much of their work is removal of waste and invasive species, but these efforts set the stage tor successful planting of new specimens. Alternatively, consider donating to the FLOS's Tributes and Trees Program, to acknowledge an important person in your life (or an important animal? – I may need to check on this!). This fund will provide us with additional options for tree purchases.

Other ideas: put up more butterfly, bat, and bee shelters in your yard. Leave your sunflower heads and stems for overwintering, as well as leaf mulch on the ground. Plant more milkweed: pink, yellow, or white. More sun on your property than a month ago? It's not too late to plant some coneflowers. Buy a birdbath – they're on sale in late summer, and birds are not the only visitors.

Perhaps, most importantly, get out and see Riverside! Our village has more greenspace per resident than anywhere else in the country. Celebrate our readily accessible, beautiful landscape...take a tour with FLOS or wander on your own. It will enhance your well-being, and support peace of mind.

## Old-time Baseball Rolls to Riverside

### Saturday, July 30 at the Big Ball Park

Pull up your suspenders and grab those wooden bats. It's time to watch Vintage Baseball, a new tradition at Riverside's Big Ball Park. The Chicago Salmon and Blue Island Brewmasters will face off on Saturday, July 30 at 1:00 PM. Admission is free for all.

Vintage baseball is a time-honored national sport where participating teams play by 1860s rules. Fittingly for Riverside, not only was Big Ball Park included in Frederick Law Olmsted's original design, but one of the first village developers was a founder of the Chicago White Stockings.

According to the national Vintage Baseball Association website, there were hundreds of baseball clubs competing in the 1860s in the Midwest and East Coast. The website notes that women were allowed to play baseball in the 1860s, and spectators will see women in bloomers and possibly hoop skirts playing during the Salmon vs. Brewmasters game. The Salmon's roster, for example, includes Second basewoman Katie "Flapjack" Baer and pitcher Madelyn "Man Hands" Grish.



Rules of the 1860s game are different from that of today. For example, the teams do not play on a standard baseball diamond but prefer an open field. Bats must be round and made of wood and of "any length to suit the striker." You can read the old-time rules on the Salmon's website or they will be available at the game.

## The Olmsted Overlook – A Gift for the Ages

### Thanks to Volunteers, Professionals, Neighbors & Village Officials

On Saturday, April 23 of this year, a group of FLOS members and friends planted a grove of trees overlooking the river on the west side of Swan Pond bluff. The grove, dubbed the "Olmsted Overlook," commemorates the 200th birthday of Frederick Law Olmsted.

Designed by local landscape architect, Shawn Sinn, the Olmsted Overlook features native trees, consistent with Riverside's focus as a certified arboretum. It was important to have a design for the grove since Olmsted himself launched the profession of landscape architecture. Landscape contractor Tom Lupfer also provided crucial work crews to help move the trees and dig holes.

The volunteer efforts will continue through this summer and the next two growing seasons as team members water the newly planted trees. The Village of Riverside has also gifted FLOS with a park bench, to be positioned under the shade of the new trees and offering a beautiful view.

## Walking Tours of Riverside

It's the 200th anniversary of Frederick Law Olmsted's birth, and what better way to celebrate than to take a walking tour of Olmsted's Riverside, America's first planned suburb and a National Historic Site.

Today, this magical place of lush landscaping, curving streets, gas lamps, and charming parks still fulfills Olmsted's dream. It has since inspired architects such as Frank Lloyd Wright and Louis Sullivan to create some of their most beautiful works. Over 70 landmarked structures representing over 150 years of American architecture dot the village.

The Frederick Law Olmsted Society of Riverside invites you experience this very special American place, a place with a hidden history that may surprise you.

Two separate docent-led tours alternate monthly on the following Sundays.



### At Home in Chicago: A Living History of Domestic Architecture

Wednesday, September 21 at 7:00 PM at the Riverside Public Library

Author Patrick F. Cannon and photographer James Caulfield will present an inside look at some of the Chicago area's most distinctive and architecturally-significant residences – including Riverside's Coonley Estate.



This presentation, based on Cannon and Caulfield's recently published book, At Home in Chicago: A Living History of Domestic Architecture, will span the history of Chicago residential architecture. The authors travelled across the metropolitan region to create an eye-opening look at the city's 200-year history through different home styles. They inspected houses built before the 1871 Great Chicago Fire, walked through the mansions that rose during the Gilded Age, explored apartments finished before the Depression, and scrutinized mid-century and new-century homes. Frank Lloyd Wright's Coonley Estate is featured in their book and will be given special emphasis for this Riverside presentation.

Patrick F. Cannon had a long career as a publicist, journalist, and editor and has led tours of Chicago-area architecture for more than four decades. After retiring, Patrick decided to build upon a long interest in architecture by writing about Chicago area architects and architecture. Since the publication of his first book, *Hometown Architect: The Complete* Buildings of Frank Lloyd Wright in Oak Park and River Forest, in 2006, he has since published five more books in collaboration with one of Chicago's preeminent architectural photographers, James Caulfield. Their combined effort on The Space Within: Insider Great Chicago Buildings received the Gold Medal in the Independent Publishers Book Awards.





James Caulfield has been a professional photographer for more than 40 years, creating compelling images of people, places, and things both in the U.S. and abroad for advertising and direct clients alike. His interest in architectural subjects grew out of his own efforts restoring a Fromann & Jebsen-designed bank in Chicago, a mid-century modern home in Glencoe, and a bungalow in Berwyn. This passion for preservation led James to volunteer his services to the Frank Lloyd Wright Trust in Oak Park by documenting the buildings on the Trust's annual house walk, Wright Plus. There, he met architectural writer Patrick F. Cannon in 2004 and the two have collaborated on six books. Their most recent is At Home in Chicago.

Join us for a visually engaging presentation of Chicago homes that spans the decades with varied architectural styles from Richardson's Glessner House and Wright's Robie House to van der Rohe's 860-880 Lake Shore Drive and Jeanne Gang's Aqua tower.
