President's Letter


Fall is gradually drifting towards us on little yellow leaves, perhaps not yet enough to rake, but several more immediate events are upon us as well.

Fall is the season of migratory bird movement, and will continue to be so until about mid-October. As the weather cools, the number of birds increases, and while many waterbirds migrate in daylight, far more species use the night skies; as many as **750 million per night** by early October! A key to helping our feathered friends is turning off your outdoor lights, or any excess lights that are not absolutely essential between 6:30 PM and 12:30AM (peak migration hours). Just as we've promoted No-mow May, so too should we encourage "reduced light early autumn". The birds are fully capable of using the stars and weather, as well as long-standing instinct to get from their summer homes to the winter refuges without any artificial illumination.

In the human world, there have been autumnal celebrations of the harvest and the anticipation of the hibernation months for thousands of years. The Olmsted Society will join these tradition with our <u>HopStop craft beer festival</u> on September 30th at the Riverside Train Station from 3:00 to 6:00 PM. <u>Tickets are going fast</u>, so get yours before there are none! This is a family-friendly event, so those who are not beer-drinkers will still find potables and food, as well as music.

The Olmsted Society has planned a field trip to the Illinois Institute of Technology campus in Chicago led by Prof. Michelangelo Sabatino on October 21 (note the new date for this outing). Purchase tickets on the Olmsted Society website. Your ticket includes the tour, bus transportation and a boxed lunch.

Connie Guardi Wins National Olmsted Network Award

Recognized for Sustained Service to Olmsted Society & Riverside

Olmsted Society board member and former board President Constance (Connie) Guardi has been selected by the Olmsted Network Board of Directors as this year's recipient of the Caroline Loughlin Volunteer Service Award. Established in 2005 to recognize "extraordinary dedication and commitment to the preservation of the Olmsted legacy." Named after Caroline Loughlin— a valued trustee, officer, and long-time supporter of the National Association for Olmsted Parks—the award has been given to trailblazers such as Charles Beveridge, Newt Levee, Susan Rademacher, Gerry Wright, and Lucy Lawliss for their efforts to promote and protect the Olmsted legacy.



The National Association of Olmsted Parks, now rebranded as the Olmsted Network, received a bumper crop of nominations from around the nation for this year's prestigious award, but Constance Guardi surpassed them all. In the congratulatory letter to Connie, the President and CEO of the Olmsted Network wrote "I can think of no more worthy recipient and look forward to bestowing it on you!"

Constance Guardi's accomplishments are many. She has been a leading light of the Frederick Law Olmsted Society of Riverside, Illinois, and the Riverside Historical Commission for 38 years. She is co-author of the Arcadia book "Riverside," facilitated the PBS program "Ten Towns That Changed America," hosted by Geoffrey Baer. Connie worked closely with IIT to create the display at the Riverside Train Station that features a permanent pictorial exhibit on Riverside history titled "Picturing Riverside," and coordinated and implemented Riverside celebrations for the Olmsted 200 anniversary.

The award will be presented at the September 21 awards dinner in Milwaukee, Wisconsin at the Grohmann Museum.

Olmsted Society Supports Girl Scout Bronze Award Project

Triangle Landscaped with Native Trees & Plants

This year, Olmsted Society gave \$400 to a local Girl Scout troop for the improvement of the T56 Triangle at Westover, Northgate and Loudon Roads. This is one of Riverside's signature triangles, as it is a very important route into our town.

The Girl Scouts of Troop 45954 (Central School 5th Grade) requested funding for the plant materials through in-person and Zoom presentations to the Olmsted Society and other civic and governmental groups. The Olmsted Society donation was critical for purchasing plant material and serving as a catalyst for other organizations to support this project.

To allow as many girls to participate in the project as possible, two short site clean-up days were scheduled this May. The scouts removed 20 invasive buckthorn trees and prepared the area for planting.

On May 20th, planting day was a success! The scouts planted one Blue Beech, one Ironwood, two Redbuds and 400 native plants, including Sand Coreopsis, Ohio Spiderwort, Wild Strawberries, Wild Violets and Star Sedge. The Triangle already had Witch-hazels, Redbuds, Horse Chestnut as understory plants and Sugar Maples, Ironwood, Swamp White Oak, Burr Oaks, Black Oak, Pin Oaks, Shagbark Hickory, Honey Locust, Red Mulberry and Blue Ash trees. Wow what a great diverse site! The trees and plants together support a biodiverse ecosystem that is beneficial to bugs, butterflies, and birds. Even though these hardy natives require less watering, the site was mulched, as well.

Girl Scout Troop 45954 (Central School 5th Grade) demonstrated focus and determination to earn their Bronze Award! Their efforts will help support a native ecosystem and provide a welcoming entrance to our historic village, for years to come.

June 3 – Indian Gardens Riverbank

Our workday of June 3 started with a survey of the riverbank in Indian Gardens. During the spring, sedge plugs we planted last fall were eaten by geese. Our workday focus then turned to removing invasives in the overgrown meadow. The result of our efforts produced a large burn pile of invasive plants.

July 29 – Barrypoint Road & Bourbon Spring

The July workday focused on Barrypoint Road and Bourbon Spring. Bourbon Spring is a historic site located by Swan Pond across the street from the train station parking lot. Faithful volunteers cleared truckloads of Japanese Knotweed, Buckthorn and other invasive plants that lined the street. Efforts included a record-setting grapevine removal from native trees. The sidewalk and stairs leading to Swan Pond and the Bourbon Spring marker were cleared, too.



August 19 – Akenside & Longcommon Triangle

The Olmsted Society partnered with Riverside's Landscape Advisory Commission for the last workday of summer (but not the last one of the year). Volunteers removed buckthorn and other invasive plants in the triangle at Riverside Road and Aikenside Road. Mike Collins, Riverside Village Forester, removed several loads of brush.
