resident's Letter



Dan Murphy Olmsted Society Board President

First, I am honored to be elected the Olmsted Society Board President. The mission and work of the organization are both exciting and meaningful to me. I am grateful to the members of the Board for their confidence and support in electing me to this role.

By way of an introduction, I have lived in Riverside for almost 24 years with my wife Olivia, and daughters, Amanda and Kristen. We are only in our second Riverside home, so I know that makes us "newcomers." Before joining the Olmsted Society, I was active in the St. Mary Parish and School Technology Committees. I also co-founded, and continue to co-moderate, the Riverside Exchange community email discussion group.

I joined the Olmsted Society in 2018 and since 2019, I have served as the newsletter editor and presentations chair. I will continue to coordinate the presentations for the Olmsted Society, but will happily hand over the newsletter to Cathy Maloney. I attended Loyola University Chicago as an undergraduate and earned a Master's in Learning Sciences from Northwestern University. For most of my career, I have worked in learning technology, supporting distance corporate training or higher education. Currently, I am the Director of Online Learning Technologies at Northwestern's School of Professional Studies. I was born and raised in Chicago's Beverly neighborhood, which set my expectations for what a neighborhood should be; tree-lined streets, distinctive architecture and a strong sense of community - all of these I have found in Riverside.

To be clear; the Olmsted Society supports outdoor recreation in our village parks. These activities are consistent with Olmsted's vision for Riverside and they're good for the participants, spectators, and the community as a whole. However, we did take a public stance on the plans to develop a Disc Golf course on a narrow strip of park land that connects the Scout Cabin area to the athletic fields at Indian Gardens along Fairbank Road. Our concern is that active recreation like Disc Golf in this narrow space is not compatible with the more passive forms of recreation, like walking and birding, that also take place there. It's important to note that the discs, which are heavier and more rigid than Frisbees, are thrown hundreds of feet. At a Village Board meeting last fall, former Olmsted Society Board president Yvonne Lucero read a letter on behalf of the Olmsted Society advocating that the Disc Golf course be located near existing athletic fields, so there would be better separation between disc golfers and walkers and birders. So, we're not taking a simplistic "not in my backyard" view of this. Rather, we're saying "no discs in the back of my head, please."

With the return of Spring, we will resume our long-standing warm weather programs. The first Landscape Work Day will take place this Saturday, March 16 from 9 AM to Noon at Indian Gardens near the Scout Cabin. Our guided walking tours will begin Sunday, May 26 and continue through October on the last Sunday of each month. A vintage baseball game with Riverside's "home team," the Chicago Salmon, will be played on August 4. This year, we will have a "VIP section" at the game - the VIPs, in this case, are families who recently moved to Riverside. We have other plans for 2024 in the works that we will announce in the coming months.

Preservation Award Presented to Thomas and Kelly Begani



The 2023 Frederick Law Olmsted Society Preservation Award is presented to Thomas and Kelly Begani for their work on the Norris H. Mundy House. Designed in 1868 by William LeBaron Jenny, the Mundy House is one of the oldest homes in Riverside. This award recognizes the Begani's complete restoration of this beautiful and historic home, undertaken over ten years, saving it from destruction and preserving it for generations to come.

Spirit Award Presented to Robert Dixon




Robert (Rob) Dixon received the 2023 Frederick Law Olmsted Society Spirit Award. Rob served on the Olmsted Society Board for many years, including a term as its president. Involved in many of the Society's activities, Rob also imagined and launched the very popular HopStop celebration. In partnership with Riverside Foods and other local groups, HopStop has become a "must-do" Fall event, attracting Riverside families and groups from around Chicagoland. Rob's leadership in all of the early years of this event required tireless hours of work and coordination. Rob and his wife, Kimberly, recently retired from the Olmsted Society Board, but they continue to support the cause!



3:Where your dollars go

The Olmsted Society is pleased to report on another year where your contributions have greatly enhanced the environment of Riverside. Below are some examples of where your membership and donation dollars go.



* Net of HopStop expenses, 2023 expenses approximated \$25,000.







- Stewardship (45%) includes: volunteer time and donations to Landscape Workdays, Olmsted Overlook, Library, and the Architecture Award. Includes equipment and trees purchased for the Village.
- Education (20%) includes: presentations, walking tours, and website updates.
- Community Outreach (26%) includes: such popular events as Vintage Baseball, Fourth of July, newsletter and more.
- Administration (9%): The Olmsted Society Board is 100% volunteer. Our administration expenses include insurance (about \$2,000 in 2023) and office supplies (about \$350).



Advocacy for Olmsted Design and GreenWay

The Olmsted Society Board offered this statement to the Riverside Village Board of Trustees at their meeting on September 7, 2023:

"The Frederick Law Olmsted Society appreciates the considerable work that the Parks and Recreation Department has done to plan a disc golf course. We know they (and you) are committed to offering Riverside residents enjoyable opportunities to play and interact with our unique environment. Community enrichment through nature is part of Frederick Law Olmsted's philosophy of design. We do have several concerns about the siting of the disc golf course (not the game itself, but the proposed site).

Our concerns include:

The proposed greenway/woods site co-mingles active recreation with other, more passive recreation (walking, birding, etc.). Olmsted prescribed a clear separation of active and passive recreation. FLOS would like to suggest that Parks and Rec, along with the Village Board, consider alternative locations (e.g. existing sports fields) which already have amenities (e.g. off-street parking, port-a-potties, clearly marked boundaries).

Safety issues: With co-mingled active and passive sports, the likelihood of accidents appears to be much higher.

Pending master plan/user projections: We understand that Parks and Rec plans a village-wide survey and master plan for Riverside beginning in 2024. This is a welcome opportunity for all residents to identify priorities; additionally, prospective user data for multiple activities can be better measured. We ask that you consider these ideas, and that the plans for disc golf at the proposed site be deferred until Parks and Recreation completes its village-wide survey and master plan."

Update: As of this writing, there are still plans to include three disc golf holes in the greenway between Scout Cabin and the baseball parking lot.

Valking Tours of Historic Riverside

Historic Walking Tours are back for 2024!

The entire village of Riverside, Illinois was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1970, and for good reason; it is one of the most beautiful, relaxing, and liveable places anywhere, and a must-see destination for visitors from around the world. They are attracted by its flowing landscape, designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, America's first and most famous Landscape Architect; its more than 150 years of rich architectural history, with homes by famous architects like Frank Lloyd Wright, William LeBaron Jenney, and Howard Van Doren Shaw; and its fascinating, sometimes notorious, residents down through the years.

We are happy to report the full resumption of monthly Olmsted Society tours, with requests for reservations required via our website (tours@olmstedsociety.org) and with payment via PayPal only.

These two-hour tours depart at 2:00 PM from the main Riverside Train station, south side of BNSF RR tracks, east side of platform, located at Bloomingbank Road at Riverside Road. These are \$25 per person (\$20 for seniors 62+ and Olmsted Society members).

We also offer customized, special tours, on request, and at any time, for our local, out of town, and international visitors. These are normally \$30 per person and require a pre-arranged deposit.

What better way to celebrate years of Olmsted's legacy than to take a walking tour of Riverside, America's first planned suburb and a national historic site?

Today, this magical place of lush landscaping, curving streets, gas lamps, and charming parks still fulfills Olmsted's dream. It has since inspired architects such as Frank Lloyd Wright and Louis Sullivan to create some of their most beautiful works. Over 70 landmarked structures representing over 150 years of American architecture dot the village.

The Frederick Law Olmsted Society of Riverside invites you to experience this very special American place. A place with a hidden history that may surprise you.

Hidden Gems Road Trip: Along the Des Plaines River

March 28 at 7 PM at the Riverside Public Library

"Hidden Gems Road Trip" features photographs that speaker Pat Camalliere took of historic and scenic

locations along the Des Plaines River, beginning at the Chicago Portage and ending in Lockport. Pat used these locations in the writing of her historic mystery novels. The talk reveals why these places are important to the area's history, how they look today, and how to visit them.

Included in the program is a handout with maps that pinpoint each location and directions to find them. Most of the places are little-known, open for visitors, and are located within a thirty-minute drive of the southwest suburbs.

Pat Camalliere is the author of the popular, five-star-rated Cora Tozzi Historical Mystery Series. She lives with her husband in Lemont, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago, where her stories are based. Camalliere's books will be available for purchase and signing before and after the talk.

Spongy Moths & Cicadas: Facts & Fallacies

Wednesday, April 10 at 7 PM

Dr. Frederic Miller of the Morton Arboretum and Riverside Village Forester Michael Collins will address two threats to

Riverside trees and plant life; the ongoing danger of the Spongy Moth and the return of the 17year cicada brood this summer. Spongy Moths pose a threat to trees and plants during their caterpillar stage. The caterpillars feed voraciously on leaves, defoliating trees and weakening them. In severe infestations, they can even kill their host tree. While adult cicadas don't directly harm trees and plants by feeding on them, their egg-laying behavior can damage young twigs and branches. Female cicadas slit the bark of woody plants to deposit their eggs, which can cause breaking, wilting or dieback in affected limbs. Dr. Fredric Miller is Senior Scientist – Entomology at The Morton Arboretum, in Lisle, Illinois. Michael Collins has been Riverside's Municipal Forester for 19 years. Prior to his arrival in Riverside, Michael worked at Cantigny Gardens as Grounds Arborist and the Morton Arboretum as a Research Assistant.

Donald and Tanya Smith Present A History of Chicagoland in Maps

Tuesday, May 14 at 7:00 PM at the Riverside Public Library

Since Frederick Law Olmsted studied land surveying as a young man and personally surveyed the terrain that would become Riverside, it is fitting that the Olmsted Society welcomes Donald and Tanya Smith of Greeley-Howard-Norlin & Smith, land surveyors and map makers.

The Smith's wide-ranging presentation will span time from the founding of the U.S. through the 20th Century. Topics will include: The U.S. Government's plan to sell land to pay off Revolutionary War debt and Thomas Jefferson's idea to divide the country into uniform townships, company founder Samuel Greeley serving as an expert witness for Abraham Lincoln in two court cases, rebuilding after the Great Chicago Fire, and the companies contemporary work with the Sears Tower. The Smiths will also bring antique surveying instruments and a number of historical maps and atlases – including an 1891 real estate advertisement map of Riverside.

Donald and Tanya Smith, owners of the land surveying & map making company Greeley-Howard-Norlin & Smith, own, preserve, protect and maintain a large collection of historical documents dating back to the early 1800s. Don and Tanya have invested immense amounts of their time, energy, money and care into the organization and research of the gathered historical materials which include 190 map atlases and more than 400,000 hand-drawn maps and plats dating from 1820 to 1990. https://www.chicagolandhistorymaps.org/
